

Title: Associate Professor, Percussion

The Faculty of Music at the University of Toronto invites applications for a full-time, tenure-stream position at the rank of Associate Professor in the area of Percussion beginning July 1, 2017.

Applicants must have experience and demonstrated excellence in working with percussionists at the undergraduate and graduate levels as well as a superior performing profile. Excellence in research is required as demonstrated by evidence of solo performances in major venues, collaborations with major artists and ensembles, public presence through broadcasts and recordings, recognition through critical reception, positive reviews and arts grant support, as well as strong endorsements by referees of high international standing. The successful candidate will also have expertise in at least one complementary area, such as chamber music, orchestral performance, contemporary music, world music, improvisation, and music production. Teaching excellence will be demonstrated through experience with individual studio lessons, chamber music coaching, and masterclass teaching; classroom teaching experience is desirable. The successful candidate will be expected to take the lead role in the administration of the percussion area. A DMA or comparable professional performance experience is required by the time of appointment. Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience.

The Faculty of Music is a division of the University of Toronto, Canada's largest university. Located in the heart of one of North America's most diverse and culturally vibrant cities, the Faculty of Music plays a vital part in Toronto's active musical life and offers undergraduate and graduate degrees in composition, music education, music and health sciences, music technology and digital media, musicology/ethnomusicology/music theory, and performance, including jazz and opera. There are 900 students, 600 undergraduate and 300 graduate students. Of these, approximately 300 undergraduates and 160 graduate students are enrolled in performance programs.
