

The Faculty of Music, University of Toronto invites applications for a full-time tenure-stream position in choral conducting and choral music education. This appointment is at the rank of Associate Professor and will begin July 1, 2018.

Qualifications: Applicants must have extensive experience and demonstrated excellence in working with students at the undergraduate and graduate levels as well as a superior professional conducting profile. A doctoral degree in Music is required as well as creative professional profile recognized for international excellence. Excellence in creative professional activities and research is required as demonstrated by evidence such as performances in major venues, collaborations with major artists and ensembles, public presence through broadcasts and recordings, recognition through critical reception, academic and professional publications, and arts grant support, as well as strong endorsements by referees of high international standing. The successful candidate will also have an excellent track record in conducting education as demonstrated by individual or small group studio lessons, coaching or masterclass teaching. Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience.

Responsibilities: Duties will include conducting university choirs, teaching undergraduate and graduate music courses in choral music and conducting, individual and small-group lessons, research supervision and mentoring of graduate conducting students at the masters and doctoral levels, community engagement with other choral and educational organizations, running an annual professional development conducting symposium, and leadership participation in the administration of the choral and graduate conducting areas.

The Faculty of Music is a division of the University of Toronto, Canada's largest university. Located in the heart of one of North America's most diverse and culturally vibrant cities, the Faculty of Music plays a vital part in Toronto's active musical life and offers degrees in composition, music education, music and health sciences, music technology and digital media, musicology/ethnomusicology/music theory, and performance, including jazz and opera. There are 900 students, 600 undergraduate and 300 graduate students. The Choral Area currently includes four choirs involving approximately 200 music majors.
