# **The Program**

The U of T Organ program offers an excellent, well-rounded curriculum which provides an exceptional student experience that is flexible and personalized. Our distinguished faculty bring a wide variety of professional experience as educators, performers, entrepreneurs, and researchers to enrich the learning environment.

The depth and breadth associated with the courses allows for individual nurturing and artistic growth. Small class sizes and a closely knit, supportive community with ample opportunities for collaboration are highlights of the program. The faculty is home to two tracker action organs: a newly-refurbished two-manual tracker-action Casavant (II/28) and a practice instrument by Létourneau (II/10). Both organs are available to students for lessons, performances, and practice. Regular master class opportunities are offered with guest artists, most recently with Marco Petricic and William Porter.

U of T Organ students benefit from many opportunities to establish connections within the U of T campus as well as throughout the vibrant musical community of the City of Toronto. Paid professional work both on and off campus is facilitated through our Music Booking Office.

## KEVIN KOMISARUK,

Associate Professor, Teaching Stream Kevin Komisaruk has performed extensively throughout Europe and North America and has been broadcasted on CBC/SRC, NPR, and Radio France. As a liturgical musician and choral director, Komisaruk has served as Director of Music at various churches in Toronto and Montreal. His scholarship explores intersections between performance practice, rhetoric, flow theory, kinaesthetics, and improvisation, and how these impact the spiritual, emotional, and physical health of artists and listeners. In practice he develops applications for advanced musical performance in medicine, especially palliative care and stroke rehabilitation.



#### AARON JAMES, Sessional Instructor

Aaron James performs regularly as an organ recitalist in both Canada and the United States. He was the 2011 winner of the National Organ Playing Competition of the Royal Canadian College of Organists, the Florence and Stanley Osborne Organ Competition and the Howard Fairclough Organ Competition. A regular performer of contemporary music, Aaron has given national or world premieres of numerous new compositions .Aaron's research has been presented at conferences in Canada, the United States and the United Kingdom. His published work appears in the Journal of the Alamire Foundation and Renaissance Quarterly.

#### JOHN TUTTLE, Sessional Instructor

Organist John Tuttle maintains the position of Organist and Choirmaster of Trinity College Chapel at the University of Toronto, where he trains the Trinity Chapel Choir for weekly services, works with the Bevan Organ Scholar, and coaches the Divinity students in liturgical music. Tuttle is founder of the Exultate Chamber Singers, a twenty-voice ensemble that has gained a national reputation for superb choral singing.

#### PATRICIA WRIGHT, Sessional Instructor

From 1986 to 2022, Patricia Wright served as Minister of Music of Metropolitan United Church in Toronto where she played the largest pipe organ in Canada, conducted several choirs, managed a concert series, and oversaw a varied programme of arts in worship. Active as a recitalist, adjudicator, and clinician, Wright has been heard in recital in Canada, the USA, and Europe and has been broadcast on the CBC. She is a founding member and past national co-chair of the United Church of Canada Association of Musicians and is a past national president of the Royal Canadian College of Organists.
